Description

Constructed on the site of the old Rowcroft House, the Lloyds Bank building was built in 1930-1 by Gloucester architects Waller & Son, using ashlar stone. It is a single-storey structure.

It has a reticent Ionic façade, with four stone columns. The roof is flat with some balustrading along the front, and there's a raised flat section in the centre of the roof (to accommodate the interior dome).

The interior consists of a large, impressive banking hall with a dome and lunette windows. The dome and ceiling have been painted to good effect, with different colours highlighting the different sections.
